### **Lesson Topic: Use "both... and"**

#### **Question 1:**

Which answer choice correctly uses correlative conjunctions to combine the two sentences?

The man bought a new pair of pants for the wedding. The man bought a new jacket for the wedding.

- The man bought a new pair of pants and a new jacket both for the wedding.
- The man bought both a new pair of pants and a new jacket for the wedding.

- The man both bought a new pair of pants and a new jacket for the wedding.

#### **Question 2:**

### Question 1:
